 - b. How does singing together teach each other?
 - c. How do the Psalms inform our understanding of the relationship between teaching and singing? (hint: The Psalms is one of the most theological books in the Bible).
- 3. Paul presents a broad range of songs we are to sing.
 - a. What are the three categories of songs we sing in church?
 - b. What does this tell us about the nature of singing in church?
 - c. According to Col 3:16, what should motivate our singing?
 - d. How can we do that when we are suffering, feel overwhelmed, or are burdened by life?
- 4. Part of how we are addressing one another is in songs that sing of God and His mighty deeds.
 - a. Why, beyond teaching, are these songs we should sing together?
 - b. What happens in a congregation whose heart is right before the Lord when they gather together in song?
 - c. How can congregational singing encourage someone who is struggling or doesn't feel like singing?
- 5. Even though the audience is each other, ultimately, we're singing praises to God with thankfulness in our hearts.
 - a. Why is it important to keep the focus of our music on God and His mighty work, and not just on ourselves or what we might do for Him?
 - b. How has the message changed the way you think about congregational singing?
 - c. How will it change the way you sing in church?
